St David's Day Dinner and tribute to David Dudgeon

Our dinner, held in March 2022 at Hart's Hill Inn Whitesboro, provided occasion to pay tribute to David Dudgeon III, a long-time member of our society, who had recently passed away. In addition to being an organizer of the society events, David was also an avid participant in other area Welsh events such as Remsen and Nelson. He also participated at the North American Gymanfa and was instrumental in developing and maintaining the society's scholarship program.

At the dinner, Rev Roger Williams gave the Invocation and Benediction. Daron Rees-Rohrbacher led the group in an enthusiastic singing of Calon Lân and Jay Williams III gave an instructional talk on the famous Welsh explorer Prince Madog. Prince Madog was once believed to have settled in North America long before the arrival of Christopher Columbus in 1170. Although the accomplishments of Madog are now disputed by most historians, he still remains a legendary figure in local folklore.

At the yearly meeting, outgoing President Linda Walters introduced the slate of officers for the upcoming year. Judge James Griffith is the new President of the Utica Society. Judge Griffith is a retired Oneida County Family Court Judge. Brian Hughes is the new Vice President. Dolores Pugh and Cindy Gilbert continue as Secretary and Treasurer respectively.

Flag ceremony speech about Welsh settlement in NY

On March 1, 2022 the St David's Society of Utica was welcomed by Utica Mayor Robert Palmieri for the annual flag ceremony at City Hall to commemorate St David's Day.

Mayor Palmieri presented the members with a declaration proclaiming March 1st as St David's Day in Utica, then gave a brief talk outlining some of the contributions of the Welsh to Central New York

The Welsh first came to Central New York in 1795. Six families from North Wales purchased land from Baron von Steuben who was a Revolutionary War hero. Baron Von Steuben was a Prussian soldier who volunteered his service to General George Washington at Valley Forge. He is credited with training and restoring the morale to the struggling Continental Army. A grateful New York State granted Steuben 16,000 acres in Upstate New York which he gradually subdivided into farms.

The original Welsh settlers were soon joined by others from primarily North Wales attracted to the area by the

available land. Eventually the Welsh migrated into the various cities and towns and became the dominate ethnic group in Central New York. The earliest settlers were farmers but others became involved in the construction of the Erie Canal and the Industrial Revolution. Because The Erie Canal was a gateway to the West, Utica became a cultural center for the early Welsh immigrants. Utica was the site for four North American Gymanfa Meetings and the early site for Welsh publishing

Rugby Party: Wales v England
