Welsh immigration is theme at Heritage Day

Our Society held its second Heritage Day at the Oneida County History Center on Genesee Street in Utica. The theme was the coming of Welsh immigrants to Oneida County.

The first immigrants were from North Wales in 1795, settling in the Remsen-Steuben area on the estate of Revolutionary War hero Baron von Steuben. After the war, a grateful New York gave him 16,000 acres of land which he subdivided, the first parcels being sold to Welsh families. Soon many others came and the Welsh became the largest ethnic group in Central NY.

Visitors were entertained by Peggy and Timothy Behrendt of Cold Brook, NY. Peggy played the harp, accompanied by her husband Timothy. They also played harmonica, flute and guitar performing a selection of songs including the Welsh folk classic "All through the Night."

Guests visited various booths with Welsh food and memorabilia. Cindy Gilbert and Janet Washburn served tea cakes and bara brith while Wendy Jones Divine served tea. David Dudgeon had a live PC station helping visitors trace their Welsh roots. Norm Jones sold Welsh items and Shirley Tolbert and Barbara Richardson displayed Welsh books, keepsakes and photos.

We hope to expand the festival and perhaps make it a regular celebration of Welsh heritage.
